Severe weather events such as hurricanes, tornadoes, flash floods and winter storms can cause a great deal of damage to communities, overwhelming emergency responders and available resources. These events often unfold quickly, and come without any warning.

To help Mooresville citizens better prepare for weather-related emergencies, Mooresville Fire-Rescue offers free training for a Community Emergency Response Team (CERT). CERT training is designed to enable citizens to care for themselves and their neighbors during the first three days following a disaster.

CERT volunteers are trained to respond safely, responsibly and effectively to emergency situations, but they can also support their communities during non-emergency events as well.

CERT offers a consistent approach to volunteer training that professional responders can rely on during disaster situations, allowing them to focus on other tasks. Through CERT, the community's capabilities to prepare for, respond to and recover from disasters is built and enhanced.

CERT training is broken into four categories:

Disaster Preparedness Fire Suppression Medical Operations Psychology and Team Organization

Working SMOKE ALARMS

Beginning May 3, Mooresville Fire-Rescue will go door-to-door as part of their smoke alarm community canvas program. Every Tuesday and Thursday evening from 6 - 8 p.m. and every Saturday from 9 a.m. - 12 p.m., members of the department will provide smoke alarm information to Town residents.

This will continue until all residences have received the information. If no one is home at the time of visit, door hangers with the relevant information will be left on the front door. If you currently have a smoke alarm, Fire-Rescue personnel will check to make sure it's working properly and install a new one if needed.

Approximately 25,000 people die in home fires every year in the United States. Smoke inhalations is the most common cause of death in a house fire, and a working smoke alarm is the cheapest life-saving item to have to prevent this from happening.

Once a smoke alarm is installed, test it monthly to ensure it's working properly, and change the batteries twice a year. An easy reminder is changing the batteries when changing clock times for daylight savings time. Smoke alarms are now also available with strobe lights for hearing impaired residents.

Tree Removal Permit Needed

According to the Town's zoning ordinance, all development within the Town shall be required to protect specimen trees on a development site. Any development site within the Town must have a tree removal permit prior to removing ANY tree for ANY reason.

According to the Town's zoning ordinance 11.8 "specimen trees shall not be cut, severely pruned, removed, pushed over, killed or otherwise harmed." The ordinance also states "for each specimen tree removed, three replacement trees measuring at least 2.5 inches must be planted."

Failure to comply may result in fines up to \$500 per tree not planted, and this payment must be received within 30 days of the



notice. A non-monetary penalty, in the form of increased or additional planting requirements, may be assessed in addition to or instead of monetary penalties.


Water Conservation Made Easy

As spring arrives, water useage will increase. To avoid dramatically higher water/sewer bills each month, consider a rain barrel. Rain barrels, when installed properly, collect stormwater runoff from your roof and gutters that you can use for watering your lawn and garden.

By using harvested rainwater to water your lawn and garden, not only are water bills reduced, water is also conserved and diverted from the Town's storm drain system. This reduces the amount of potential pollutants from entering local rivers, creeks and streams.

Keep in mind that this water is considered nonpotable. Stormwater runoff from your roof can carry microorganisms, pollutants, chemicals and debris. It is not treated, and therefore should not be used as drinking water.

The Town offers rain barrels for sale. Each barrel comes with a brass spigot, two overflow valves to



connect additional barrels and a screen to keep out debris and insects. Sale prices are \$90 for the 60 gallon barrel and \$100 for the 80 gallon barrel. To place an order, contact the Water/Sewer Billing Office at 704-663-3800.
